North American Native



Filipendula (fil-i-pen-dew-la)
From the Latin *filum*, a thread,
and *pendulus*, hanging,
referring to the threads
connecting the root tubers.

rubra (rew-bra) meaning red.

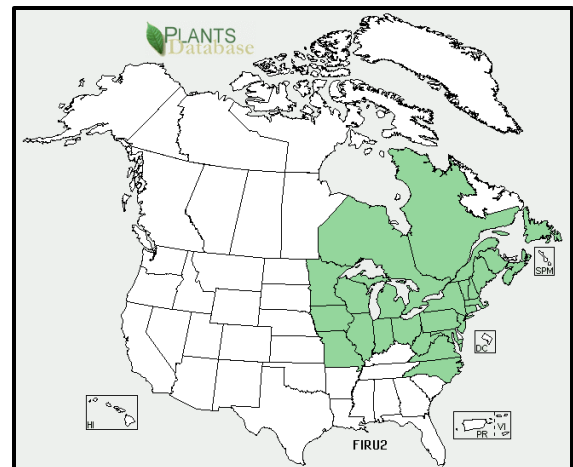


Common Name: Queen of the Prairie

Family: Rosaceae

A native perennial that forms large clumps of deeply divided foliage and grows 3-7’. In the summer, tall stems of pale pink *Astilbe*-like fragrant flowers rise above the bright green leaves. Will form colonies in consistently moist sights.

Habitat: Queen of the Prairie is found in black soil prairies, moist sand prairies, moist meadows and along rivers in the cooler climates of central and eastern North America.

In the Garden: It prefers moist humus-rich soil and is great for the back of the border, naturalized areas, wet meadows or moist areas along streams or ponds. Provide part shade in warmer climates.
